Emporia Amateur Radio Society Activities for 2013

- Thursday Night 2-meter Net -- The club continues to host a net for club business at 9:00 pm local time every Thursday evening on the 146.985 repeater. Net control for the evening rotates among several operators and included Jason Brinkman (KOSSZ), Jon Holder (NOOFG), Tim East (KOEMP), Robert Neer (KDOMQF), Robert Lowery (KDOFEG), Dwight Moore (KDOOIX), and Connie Steinel (KOUER).
- Web Site -- The club has a web site at http://www.qsl.net/emporiaars/. Les Elliott (KCOPTO) is the web master for the web site. Les (KCOPTO) also serves the club as our public information officer and qsl manager. The club also registered the domain name emporiahamradio.org and that domain is automatically redirected to the web site at qsl.net.
- Ham Cram Tim East (K0EMP) organized two ham crams; one on 27 July and another on 28 September. The review for the technician pool was had good attendance, however, the review for the general pool had no students on either date. - VE testing -- Tim East (K0EMP) also organized four VE testing sessions, two of which were right after the ham crams and two others on 27 April and 21 November.
